

Selection Criteria

- At least completed one year of study in bachelor's degree programme before commencing the exchange programme
- Have a good academic track record with a minimum cumulative CGPA of 2.8 (for the College and Departmental Exchange Programmes)
 (i) CGPA after the examination result of Summer 2024 will be considered
 (ii) students who have cumulative CGPA of 2.5 or above is eligible to apply for the Institutional Level Exchange Programmes offered by the Global Engagement Office
- Meet the admission requirements of the host university (e.g. GPA, IELTS, TOEFL, foreign language, etc)
- Fulfill the following English language requirement (optional for applicants who choose to study in Mainland or Taiwan):

 (i) a minimum TOEFL score of 79 (Internet-based)/213 (Computer-based), or
 (ii) IELTS Band 6.5 or above, and
 (iii) the test date of your report should be after October 2021, i.e. valid for duration of two years until end of October 2023

Internship

MS3403 - Internship for Management Sciences

Department liaises with local, mainland, and overseas companies that offer internships to our students. For any full-time non-local internship that is not less than six weeks, students will receive the departmental internship subsidy. It may not be available if the subsidy cannot be downloaded to the department finally.

- Credit Units: 3
- Course Duration: Semester A, B and Summer
- Coursework: 100%

Course Aims :

- Enrich students' learning experience through interactions with professionals in the business world through internship tasks.
- Enable students to gain valuable work experience for acquiring in-depth and practical understanding of operation management in business organization between 6 to 12 weeks during the summer semester.
- Enhance student competitiveness in the job market and discovery experience before their graduation

MS3404 - Internship, Training and Career Development (non-credit bearing)

- Credit Units: 0
- Course Duration: Semester A, B and Summer
- Coursework: 100%

Course Aims :

This course is designed to enhance and enrich students' educational experience by integrating the academic component of their degree programme with the practical workplace experience gained at the internship site in local and/or international contexts. The course provides an opportunity for students to apply management sciences theories, practices, and skills in the workplace setting, and to critically reflect on the efficacy of the knowledge learnt in the classroom.

Disney International College Programme

Every year, students have the chance to participate in the International College Programme (ICP) at Walt Disney World at Florida, US for three months. Students are well-prepared before the internship through a two-day preparatory training workshop on business ethics, business etiquette and interpersonal communication skills. ICP offers students from any academic discipline outstanding learning opportunities through different courses, and all students are evaluated on their performance and a report from their immediate supervisor. Students are assigned jobs in Character, Operations, Custodial, Merchandise, and Quick Service Food & Beverage. They are involved in the Disney magic by sharing and interacting with guests, learning important business philosophies, and making friends with people all over the world.

CB3800 Business Practice Internship

The internship is designed to provide students with real life working experience in local contexts for a period of time. With placements in international businesses, banking, financial services, insurance, accountancy firms, etc., students are expected to gain in-depth and practical understanding of business operations and the professional contexts in which they are expected to apply the theory and skills they have learned in the formal curriculum.

Students will be placed into a multi-national corporation for six weeks full-time internship during the summer. Before the internship, students shall participate in a 2-day workshop on business ethics, business etiquette and interpersonal communication skills. At the end of the internship, students are required to prepare and submit a report.

Campus Internship Scheme (CIS)

Introduction

To better consolidate students' work-based learning experience and to enhance their professional and personal development on campus, a Task Force chaired by the Vice-President (Student Affairs) has conducted a review of the On-campus Service-learning Scheme (OSS) in October 2011 and has recommended the introduction



of two new schemes, namely the Campus Internship Scheme (CIS) and the Campus Work Scheme (CWS), for implementation on 1st July 2012 to replace the OSS.

Starting from 1 July 2020, CWS will cease to be implemented so that the hiring and management of student helpers will be decentralized for the Recruiting Units, while CLC will continue to manage CIS.

- To enhance students' understanding of the work environment and their long term personal and professional development
- To develop students' analyltical, problem-solving, and interpersonal skills to engage in discovery and innovation
- To facilitate students' career exploration and add value to their employability.

Student Mentoring Scheme (SMS)

he purposes of SMS are:

- To help first-year students adjust to university education;
- To develop a supportive personal network amongst first-year students and senior students;
- To create a warm atmosphere and positive academic culture in the campus;
- To assist first-year students in enhancing their educational experience and development as a person and as a professional in their chosen fields of study.

The scopes of SMS are:

- The range of activities can be very comprehensive, from educational to entertaining, personal to professional;
- The student mentors can assume very flexibly the roles of big brother / sister, adviser, informationprovider, counselor, coach or private tutor, or simply friend;
- The types of activities and relationship really depend on the needs of the first-year students and their chemistry with the mentors.

Industrial Mentoring Scheme (IMS)

Our Mentorship Program aims at establishing a caring and supportive relationship between City University alumni, business executives (mentors) and undergraduates (mentees) to achieve the following objectives:

- To facilitate the educational, social and personal growth of mentees
- To develop mentees' fullest potential, vision and aspirations for the future
- To enhance mentees' future professional and career development
- To empower mentees to face challenges in society

A mentoring relationship is one that encourages discussion, questions and feedback regarding those areas that will enhance the mentees' capabilities/competencies. These capabilities may be job related, but may also be in the area of school or life in general.

How does the mentorship program work?

The mentor and the mentee would agree on the level of commitment, mode and frequency of interaction, as well as the preferred focus through the mentorship process. Each mentor is encouraged to take on one to three mentees during the same period. At least one face to face meeting is highly recommended. Other activities can be arranged depending on individual mentors and mentees such as:

- regular contact through phone or email
- campus visits by mentors
- workplace visits by mentees
- leisure and social activities


